



With her service animal, America's Vet Dogs Charlie, by her side, she continues to work worldwide as an independent photographer and is an author, educator, military consultant, BRAVO748 public speaker and founder of the Veterans Portrait Project.

Action.” She has recently become the Associate Producer of National Content for South Carolina ETV.




Featured Veterans | Episode 1



BOBBY HENLINE



A veteran of Desert Storm by age 19, Bobby Henline was inspired to re-enlist in the Army after the attacks on September 11, 2001. He deployed to Iraq three times, twice with the 82nd Airborne Division and once with the 3rd Armored Cavalry regiment. He spent 13 years in the Army. While on his fourth tour in Iraq on April 7, 2007, an improvised explosive device (IED) blast blew up his Humvee. Of the five men in the vehicle, Bobby was the only survivor. Burns covered 40% of his body, bones in his face and shoulders were fractured, and his head was burned to the skull. Put into a medically induced coma for two weeks, he was flown back to the United States. During his initial six-month hospital stay, Bobby remained upbeat, positive, and relied on humor to get him through each day. Today, he continues his quest to make people laugh in a variety of venues by doing stand-up comedy. Bobby also presents at various military and military-related organizations to inspire soldiers, veterans, and their families, spreading his message of life, love, and joy.



TOMMY CLACK



Eighth generation Army veteran Tommy Clack was born and raised in Decatur, GA. He attended the University of Houston on a Track Scholarship before leaving college and volunteering for the Army. Tommy spent over three years in service, attaining the rank of Captain. During his tour in Vietnam, he was with the C/2/27 Infantry-Wolfhounds, of the 25th Division, as an Artillery Forward Observer. On May 29, 1969, while operating on the Cambodian border Tommy was injured from an explosion, losing all three limbs, sustaining internal injuries and loss of hearing. He then spent nearly two years in the Atlanta VA Medical Center undergoing 33 operations. Tommy finished college in 1975, as an Honor Graduate from Georgia State University. He married and had two children, Adam and Erin. Tommy retired February 29, 2012, after 47 years of military and government employment. He has traveled as a public speaker since 1970, visiting all 50 States and multiple foreign countries. Tommy has been involved in helping over 300 memorials become a reality across America honoring military members, veterans, and their families. In 1991, he received a “Point of Light” Award from President Bush, and he is also a Military’s Artillery OCS Hall of Fame inductee.



JEFFREY CROSBY



Jeffrey Crosby was born in Jacksonville, FL but grew up in Cottageville, SC. He chose to enlist in the Army because he knew he needed a change in his life. The structure, discipline, and respect helped shape Jeffrey into who he is today. He also knew he wanted justice for his country following the attacks on 9/11. In 2005, he was deployed to Iraq for 12 months. Although he came back relatively unscathed, he should have been killed multiple times. He believes God had a purpose for him, which may have been to train the mobilizing soldiers how to look for and avoid IEDs. He likes to think that something he said may have helped save their lives. Jeffrey also worked as a police officer and in the Chief Administration Office in DC as a military/veteran liaison. He is now an officer in the National Guard and lives on a small farm with his wife, Renata, and one-year-old daughter, Emersyn.

BAMBI BULLARD



Bambi Bullard was born and raised in Indianapolis, Indiana, and joined the Marine Corps with the goal of obtaining and using the Montgomery GI Bill. She stayed in the Marine Corps for 15 years. While in Camp Lejeune, she was assigned to the Criminal Investigation Division and was one of the first women to go through Military Police on-the-job training. She was transferred to Parris Island to become a Drill Instructor for recruits, where she flew through the ranks with three meritorious positions. She was a part of the last Woman Marine Companies that existed in the Marine Corps. She worked at the Pentagon for the Secretary of the Navy. During this time in the DC area, she volunteered to be the commander of a youth group working with underprivileged kids called, “Young Marines.” She earned several graduate degrees as well. Bambi has served as the Commander of the Grand Strand Women Veterans and Regent of the Carolina Gold Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution in Murrells Inlet, and is an active member of the American Legion, Rolling Thunder and POW/MIA organizations.



DAN
WRIGHTSMAN



Dan Wrightsman is the Deputy Director of Operations for the South Carolina Department of Veterans’ Affairs. He was born and adopted in Seoul, Korea by his parents. He grew up in the Army and after his father retired, he and his family moved to Texas. Shortly after he moved to California, where he graduated high school and enlisted in the United States Army as an infantryman. During his time in service, he completed Ranger School and retired after thirty years of service as a Sergeant Major. Upon retirement, he joined the South Carolina Department of Veterans’ Affairs as a way to help Veterans during their transition process and help when Veterans face challenges. He is married and has two children in high school.



DESIREE
GORDON



Desiree Gordon is a single mom, a professor, and retired Army veteran. She was born on March 16, 1970 and was raised on a tobacco farm in Hemingway, SC. She joined the United States Army at age 18, in order to escape the rigors of small farm life. She served nearly 21 years in the military, before retiring on October 1, 2009. She completed two combat tours, the Gulf War, 1991-1992, and the second in Operation Iraqi Enduring Freedom, 2005 - 2006. She also served two years as a Drill Sergeant at Fort Jackson, SC, 2000 - 2002. She is a passionate teacher and mentor, who helps others cope with their life’s journeys through her writing. Her two daughters, Kennedy and Kinsley, are the inspirations behind her popular children’s book series, “Still a Family.”

MAZIN MOZAN



Mazin Mozan was born July 31, 1982, to an average Iraqi family that believed in education and professional careers. Mazin was fluent in English and Arabic, when the Iraq War started 2003, so he worked as a part time interpreter while completing his senior year in college. Upon graduating, he focused completely on being a linguist for Coalition Forces. His family was under constant threat and extreme risk by insurgents. Mazin was forced to stay on base with the troops because every time he traveled home, insurgents attempted to kill him. His U.S. teammates convinced him to apply for a special immigrant Visa. On September 17, 2007, he arrived in Huntsville, Alabama, where Colonel Jim Bowie, his former commander in Iraq, and Colonel Dustin Awtrey, Bowie's deputy, welcomed him with open arms. He was offered a job as an Arabic linguist and deployed to Iraq once again, eventually deciding to enlist in the U.S. Army. During this time, he met his now-wife Sarah. Together they have two children, Mariam and Youssif. Mazin eventually transitioned into the U.S. Army Reserves, where he trained to become a cardiovascular technologist. He currently works at the Brook Army Medical Center in San Antonio, Texas, as a contractor and is now a commissioned officer.



DR. SAM BABU



Dr. Sam Babu was born in India and came to the United States as a green card holder for his residency. Sam had to register for the Selective Service and ended up getting drafted into the Vietnam War because they needed doctors. He was stationed with 312th Evac and worked as a radiologist. While overseas, Sam experienced a mass casualty event of over 30 men who arrived by helicopter. The doctors there had to decide who was going to live and who was going to die. Sam decided to stay in the Army, retiring after twenty-five years.



NICK PAZ



Nick Paz is from Las Cruces, New Mexico, and served in the Army as an infantryman. He was with "No Slack" Battalion 2/327 in 1BCT 101st. He served in foreign wars and eventually became a scout sniper. He is currently a board member of Repatriate our Patriots and is continuing his service in Latin America, where he is "his brothers' keeper." He helps deported veterans regain citizenship they earned through military service.

LISA
ZUNZANYIKA

» Lisa M. Zunzanyika is a retired Air Force Combat Photojournalist. During her 22-year career, Lisa traveled the world documenting the military in peacetime, wartime, and humanitarian operations. She is a graduate of the Military Photojournalism Program at Syracuse University; through which she earned the distinction of being the first African-American female Military Photojournalist in Air Force history. An award-winning photojournalist, Lisa has won numerous accolades for her talent. Of note is the 1998 Military Photographer of the Year: 1st Place Illustration category award. Her military photographs have been featured in national and international military and civilian publications as well as books such as “This Is Our War: A Soldiers’ Portfolio: Servicemen’s Photographs of Life in Iraq” by Devin Friedman and the Editors of GQ. Now a freelance photographer, her images can be found in books like “Usability Testing Essentials: Ready, Set...Test!” by Carol M. Barnum and her work was recently published in “Mantra Yoga + Health Magazine” Issue 19. While Lisa has traveled the world photographing a wide variety of subjects and events, portraiture is her passion. As she says, she “sees in portraits.”



VANESSA
SHAWVER

» Vanessa Shawver spent 24 years in the military. She was in both the Army and Air Force. She was a Blackhawk helicopter pilot in the Army, and because the first female pilot in the “Fighting Cavalry.” While in the National Guard, she was an instructor for the Officer Candidate School program. She was both an electronic warfare specialist and Flight Commander in the Air Force Reserve and spent time as an Aerial Event Coordinator as well. In her spare time, she has worked as a personal trainer and group exercise instructor, which she has been doing for 20 years. She also started the Brewers’ Cup Running Competition, which works with over 26 local breweries and has around 400 participants to promote physical activity and patronage of local businesses.



MEGGEN DITMORE

» Meggen Dittmore joined the family business when she enlisted in the service in 1997. She became the first active-duty female A-10 Thunderbolt crew chief in Air Force history. Over the course of her enlistment, she was stationed in the frigid wilds of Alaska and deployed to the expansive deserts of the Middle East during Operation Desert Fox. After her honorable discharge, she and her husband, Dusty, moved to Central Oregon where she immediately enrolled in nursing school. Despite the rigors of caring for two infant children, working full-time, commuting to school and coping with a lifelong battle with dyslexia, she achieved her dream of becoming a labor and delivery nurse, which she has been passionately practicing since. With her children now all grown and graduated, she is free to pursue her love of all things crafty. Recently, she started a small business where she creates unique, handmade dolls and keepsakes called “Meg’s Crafty Critters.”

STEPHANIE
GATTAS



Gulf War and post-9/11 Navy veteran Stephanie Gattas served two overseas tours on the USS Simon Lake. After leaving service in 2015, she founded The Pink Berets, an organization that assists women service members and veterans who struggle with Post Traumatic Stress and Military Sexual Trauma. Most recently, she founded Confidence & Co., which is currently in development to bring stories of our “Unsung Heroes” to the forefront. She also recently Co-founded Reveille Coffee Company which she will launch soon. Ms. Gattas attended the University of Incarnate Word with a major in Business Administration. She has sat on the Advisory Board for the Association of the Advancement of Mexican Americans at Risk Youths Programs; the advisory committee for San Antonio Behavioral Health where she was instrumental in the development and launching of the Yellow Rose Unit for active-duty service women struggling with addictions and Military Sexual Trauma. Currently, Stephanie sits on the steering committee for the Military Women’s Coalition started by Dr. Ellen Haring, former CEO of the Service Women’s Action Network in Washington D.C. as well as on the committee for the Arts in the Armed Forces. Most notably, she sits on the panel for the MACTeach PTSD project where she educates young men and women on the effects of PTSD within the family system.



CONNIE OSIER



Connie Osier grew up in a small town in Maine, with eight siblings. Her dad served in the Army as a truck driver. She enlisted in the Women’s Army Corps to escape a bad relationship and was actually protesting the Vietnam War prior to this. Connie got assigned to work at an eye clinic. Eventually she got out of the service after being sexually assaulted multiple times. When her command reviewed the assaults, she was told, “boys will be boys.” Because of her military sexual trauma (MST), Connie struggled for years with substance abuse, homelessness, and depression before the VA would finally help her. She also found “healing” through horses and mediation. She now lives in California with her horses but still works hard on overcoming her trauma.



COLLEEN
BUSHNELL



Retired Staff Sgt Colleen Bushnell has been a leading national advocate for military justice policy reform since 2011. Colleen is a New York native, OIF/OEF veteran, who was a public affairs specialist and trainer. Colleen’s supervisor and commander assaulted her in 2003 while she served as Lackland Air Force Base media relations manager. In 2012, Colleen cycled across the country sharing her story to compel Congressional hearings into sexual abuses at Lackland Air Force Base Basic Training. Colleen serves as a Protect Our Defenders advocacy committee member and was a former board member. Colleen continues to train and advise survivors, their families, legislators, nonprofits, and the media, about the need to professionalize the military justice system.

NINA GUERRA




Corinna “Nina” Guerra is a Latina native of San Antonio, Texas, Marine Corps Veteran, and clinical psychology doctoral student. When her career ended in the Marine Corps, she decided her service to her country, her community, will not end there. With over 10 years of professional leadership and mentoring experience, Nina founded “The Rustic Ranch” with one idea in mind: to create a space where veterans may work through emotional triggers, where healthy coping mechanisms are learned and implemented, where women and young girls gain confidence in themselves and their abilities, and where the community may come together in growth, healing, and fellowship. She is dedicated to normalizing and advocating for mental health and personal development for all veterans and their families through equine-assisted, ranch life therapy. “The Rustic Ranch” is a Veteran owned and operated 501(c)3 Nonprofit Organization in South Texas dedicated to cultivating an environment that prioritizes every Veteran’s need to process and manage all that comes with their unwavering sacrifices. The mission is to offer equine-assisted and ranch life therapy, breaking away from the everyday noise and focusing on becoming a better version of ourselves.



JOE WORLEY



Joe Worley, a U.S. Navy hospital corpsman third class who served as a field medic, lost his left leg and suffered damage to his right leg when he stepped on an IED in Iraq in September 2004. He was rushing to assist soldiers in another vehicle that had been hit by an IED when he was injured. Joe underwent numerous surgeries for an entire year before an experience with a facility dog named Duce from Walter Reed National Military Medical Center introduced him to the capabilities of service dogs. The experience led Joe to apply for a dog with the organization America’s VetDogs, which provides trained service dogs to veterans at no cost, thanks to donations. He has since become a volunteer for America’s VetDogs after seeing all the positive effects the animals can have on veterans with physical disabilities, post-traumatic stress disorder and more.



RON JOHNSON



When entering the Marine Corp in 1967, Ron Johnson was forced to find a new home for his green-wing macaw and Moluccan cockatoo when none of his friends or family members were willing to take them in. Although he was successful in rehoming the two parrots, he made a vow to one day help other birds in similar circumstances. In 1997, he made good on his promise. Together with his wife, Tammy, they founded “Feathered Friends Forever.” What started as a small operation consisting of five rescued birds quickly ballooned to eighty-five. Today, Feathered Friends Forever is located on 13 acres in Harlem, GA and continues to provide a safe haven for parrots in need. In the past 22 years, they have found loving homes for over 1,000 of our feathered friends. “Feathered Friends Forever” is a State-of-Georgia licensed animal shelter and 501(c)3 nonprofit organization. Ron’s nonprofit works diligently to improve the lives of companion birds by providing them with an intermittent or permanent haven as it endeavors to further advance avian welfare through public education and awareness efforts.

RON NOVACK



Ron Novack has served as the Executive Director for the Office of Veteran and Military Affairs (OVMA) at Syracuse University since 2015. He leads a campus portfolio responsible for all programs and initiatives related to supporting the over 1,500 military-connected students, family members, and faculty and staff veteran workforce at the university. Ron served 33 years on active duty in the United States Army – both as an enlisted soldier and officer – and retired as a Colonel in 2015. He served in the 101st Airborne Division, 82d Airborne Division, 10th Mountain Division, 3rd Infantry Division, and U.S. Special Operations Command (USASOC). He has deployed to Afghanistan and Iraq five times. Ron completed his undergraduate degree in Business Management from the University of Maryland. He also holds an MBA from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, an M.S. in National Resource Strategy from the National Defense University in Washington, D.C., and an MPA from the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University.



BRIGITTE
MARKER



Brigitte Marker knew she wanted to serve her country much like her father. However, unlike her father she didn't want to join the Army, so she opted for the Coast Guard to save lives. She completed basic training in Cape May, NJ. Her first duty station was in Oregon, where she immediately felt the sting of harassment of being a woman. Brigitte was severely injured during a training exercise when their ship crashed twice by 35 foot swells. When her command didn't believe she was injured, they began making her enlistment a nightmare which only added to her difficult recovery. Because of her experience, she was inspired to help other veterans. Brigitte has been volunteering with the DAV now for years.



ROMAINE BYRD



Romaine Byrd spent 22.5 years in the service, both active duty and reserves in the Army. He was a mechanic, working on 7 tons and Humvees as well as some track vehicles. He also spent 14 years as a recruiter, working 70–80-hour weeks. Romaine enjoyed helping young adults, who were like him as a youth. He grew up without a father and his mom died when he was young. He spent the first few years of his enlistment sending his paychecks home to his younger sisters for their survival. Romaine transitioned out of the Army on March 1, 2018, and found the TAPS program very underwhelming. It did little to aid his transition and he felt it failed other service men and women transition out to the civilian sector. Because of this, Romaine started working with “Hire Heroes,” which he says is TAPS 2.0


